The Regional Council has met two times since the September election. A retreat for the Council is scheduled in Victoria, KS at the Capuchin Spiritual Life in March. We plan to spend time in prayer, have conference talks on the Psalms, and make goals for the region. Three focuses during this election term will be Scripture, The Eucharist, and celebrating the Franciscan Centenary from 2023 - 2026. Preparations for the 2023 Summer Gathering scheduled June 9-11, 2023 at the Spiritual Life Center in Wichita are underway. National made changes to the annual report form, so the report form for local fraternities has been updated and emailed out. The form and fair share are due to the REC no later than January 31, 2023.

Geri Rupp OFS, formation director, has assembled a formation team. There will be changes coming in the future as we listen to the Holy Spirit, discover how He wants us to proceed, and carry out His desires. The regional theme chosen in September at chapter is Open Your Heart to Him. It makes me think of Article #2 of the SFO Rule and a quote by G.K. Chesterton. Article #2 reads: ... *the brothers and sisters, led by the Spirit, **strive for perfect charity** in their own secular state.* Chesterton's quote: St. Francis is a Lover. We can strive to be a "lover" like St. Francis if we open our heart to Our Lord and strive for perfect charity. Our regional theme pairs spectacularly with

Other happenings at National include the decision that the next Quinquennial will be in 2026, the same year as the end of the Franciscan Centenary celebration. The new database is about 70% complete and will hopefully be accessible in the spring. The JPIC award was presented to Louise Sandberg OFS. We reviewed and voted on the election guidelines for National.

While in Detroit we were blessed to be able to visit and tour the Blessed Solanus Casey Center, then celebrate Mass in the church in the center. Fr. Solanus Casey was a porter, answered the door and prayed with whoever came asking for help. Fr. Solanus was known to say, “Thank God ahead of time.” His tomb is in the center and while there I prayed for everyone in our Juan de Padilla Region and all of your needs.

On October 13, the Feast of Our Lady of Fatima, I had the privilege of leading a rosary in the chapel at Chapter that was attended by Chapter attendees.

Fr. 

OUTREACH TO FIRST NATION PEOPLE



On Thursday, December 8, 2022, David Ehrlich and Dan Lonquist of Brother Jacoba Fraternity made a trip to the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe at Eagle Butte, Sioux Dakota. A large truck (26 foot) delivered clothing, mattresses and box springs, furniture (chairs, couches, dressers etc.), baby seats for vehicles, kitchen wares, children books, bicycles, and more to their reservation. The reservation has over 700 families who live in extreme poverty and where unemployment is high. The return trip to Kansas was notable as the morning temperature was 4 degrees and some roads were covered with 3 - 4 inches of packed snow.

Fraternity members who were able to help load the truck in Lawrence included Monica Olivera, Scott & Janet Anderson, Ruth Entwistle, with Bob Brill providing oversight, supervision, and needed encouragement. Ray Finch, husband of Jean Finch (fraternity member), along with several additional community members were also recruited to help load the truck.

A plan to deliver winter coats, toys, and additional items to the Northern Cheyenne reservation in southeast Montana before the end of the year is in the works.

Why did St John the Apostle write the Book of Revelation? Why is it important? What does the future behold?








More than 600 Secular Franciscans gathered in Phoenix for the 20th OFS-USA Quinquennial Congress.

PEACE, JUSTICE & THE INTEGRITY OF CREATION

May our Lord give you joy and peace, my dear brothers and sisters! I have been reflecting lately about the joy I receive while doing the work of justice and peace. I was sharing this with a friend lately who asked: “How can you receive joy when you encounter so much misery and suffering?”

A legitimate question, right? I said to my friend: “Yes, the work is hard, and I do encounter misery and suffering, and that does sadden me. But I choose to transcend that sadness with the joy and peace of Christ. And I try my best to do that by being the best presence of Christ that I can be when doing the work. I want to bring God’s Presence through Jesus and the Holy Spirit to that person, in that situation.”

And for someone like me who likes to interact with people, this can be tough. But I’m learning that who I am in that moment, not what I do, is a powerful vehicle for love in that situation. I learned a very important lesson about this when I was on pilgrimage on the southern border the end of October of this year.

We were in Ciudad Juarez, Mexico and were in a camp of about 200 Venezuelan refugees and immigrants. We pilgrims knew very little Spanish, and our new Venezuelan friends knew very little English.

But the power of some of the communication that took place during the hour or so that we were with them is something I will never forget. They were eager to try to communicate with us. They smiled and gestured and gathered around us, drawing ever closer to us. A young woman standing in front of me said to me quietly: “Mi niña es muy Mal.” “My little girl is very sick.” I was caught off guard. What could I do? What could I say? So I stood in front of her with my head bowed, praying that God would communicate my care and concern for her situation through my presence and prayer, and that God would bring people to her aid. Nothing else was said. I do believe that my prayer was heard and was answered.

And as we left, one of our pilgrims asked in Spanish: “what can we do to help you?” A bit chorus of “Tell our stories!) in Spanish and English rose up from the group. “And we will pray,” we said.

Question for Reflection and Journaling

When you are in ministry situations in which you are serving others, what do you find most challenging personally? (This can be behavior exhibited by you or by others, or it can be managing a thought or feeling you have.” How might you be able to bring joy and peace into the situation, thereby allowing God’s love to shine forth through your presence?

What does being present mean to you? In what ways can you communicate that presence to another?
