*Silence. Silence is Golden.
Silent night, holy night.*

I tried to write this newsletter and no words or thoughts seemed to come. All I could think of was Greccio. My local fraternity participated in the Zoom event of the tour of Greccio. (It is now on the national website). It brought to life the simplicity and humility of our founding father and his way of life. St. Francis' first nativity only had a manger with an ox and an ass... no babe in the manger, no Mary or Joseph, no shepherds or wisemen.

I tried to put myself there, the night of Jesus birth, imagining what that might have been like to be present. I imagined the night was very cold, with a clear starry night sky, a quiet stillness, with the smells of hay and whatever else may have been present. I imagined the night to be something like my experience of growing up on the family dairy farm and how piercing cold it was in winter, still, and quiet, and stars shining brightly in the sky when I walked from the house to the barn to do the nighttime chores. I pondered what Mary might have been experiencing in her heart, mind, and body and Joseph too. Sitting in silence, thinking, and meditating on that simple manger scene brought such peace, solace, and rest.

Daily life and all its "noise," responsibilities, and busyness, distract us from where our true focus should be. At the beginning of Advent, I was busy with plans, appointments, phone calls I needed to return, zoom meetings to schedule and attend, housework to be done to prepare for decorating and more. I sat down to pray a rosary and our Lord revealed that all these things were a **river of dis-**

traction. My time, attention and focus were on everything except Him. I had become overwhelmed and anxious. He is who and what we need. I decreased the noise by turning off the radio and tv, decreased my online time, canceled appointments, and zoom meetings etc. I began to just be with Him, focusing on that simple manger scene.

I encourage and invite you to enter into the silence. Eliminate the busyness, noise, distractions, etc. during this Advent and Christmas season to spend time in silence with the Christ child in the manger scene. There are many suggestions available on the national website that can be used to help you focus, meditate, or pray this holy time of year. These can be used alone or with your fraternity or small groups. I encourage you to simplify your life, humble yourself, and enter into the silence.

I recommend this beautiful prayer, The St. Andrew Novena, as a possible starting point to enter into that silent adoration of Our Lord on the night of His birth.

*Hail and blessed be the hour
And the moment in which the Son of God was born
Of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight,
In Bethlehem, in the piercing cold,
In that hour, vouchsafe O my God!
To hear my prayer and grant my desires,
Through the merits of Our Savior Jesus Christ,
And of His Blessed Mother.*

The Riches of Poverty

What is it for someone to be meek and humble of heart and how does a soul even begin to learn and practice to become one with such a heart? Francis knew and he knew what was needed - he needed to follow Christ and learn from him. Francis knew this because he fell in love with the meek and humble of heart, that is Christ, and Lady Poverty who would be the one to help him discover the riches of poverty.

Francis learned early of Lady Poverty and with his love for Christ, could not leave the world soon enough. Separating himself from all worldly goods and attachments, Francis walked away from that world into a world where his Lady Poverty waited. Here Francis was able to love Christ as he was called - to serve the Master and live the Gospel. Much of Francis' time was spent in union with God, in preaching the Gospel and loving his neighbor. Francis daily sought to fulfill the request that Christ asks of us all, ... "Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble of heart..." (Mt 11:29)

Seeing Christ's humble beginning in a cave with a simple manger, we find a message that we as Franciscans should also seek the riches that Lady Poverty holds for us. At his birth, Christ received those riches, the gifts of meekness and humility of the manger, and later obedience and charity for the cross and all those gifts hidden within poverty. Francis, seeing Christ's own love for Lady Poverty, embraced her with total abandonment and began following Christ and learning of him.

From our Lord's birth in a manger to his death on a cross, Christ's message has been to follow him in the ways of gentleness and humbleness of heart. Christ the King was born with the yoke of poverty, given to him as a gift from his Heavenly Father. Our Lady Poverty holds many gifts to help our soul towards its own perfection and sanctification.

The following paragraph is taken from the *Introduction for Sacrum Commercium in the Omnibus page 1543: (Francis and His Lady Poverty)*

Poverty therefore became for Francis, one might almost say, the essence of his Gospel way of life, or at least the foundation upon which evangelical perfection was to be raised. It could not, of course, be the final end of his striving; the final end could only be God. But poverty was essential to his way of life and it was the rock upon which his whole spiritual life was to be founded on. Once, when the brothers, assembled in general chapter, asked him which virtue would render them most worthy to be called friends of Christ, " he opened to them the secret of his heart and replied: ' Know, brothers, that poverty is the special way to salvation, for it feeds humility and is the root of all perfection; its fruit is manifold, though hidden.' "
(Quote from St. Bonaventure, Legenda Major Chapter VII, 1)

We too can invite Lady Poverty to be with us, as Francis did, that we might share in the riches of her poverty and receive the gifts of gentleness and humility of heart. Francis thought this so important he encouraged the brothers to follow the way of Lady Poverty, that they might receive her riches which help obtain perfection and finally a way to salvation.

" Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble of heart, *and you will find rest for your souls.*" (Mt.11:29)


Kansas & Missouri Fraternities Pray for Life from Conception to Natural Death and Peace

Queen of the Angels & Franciscan Sisters Tour Christmas Creches & Medieval Art at the Nelson Art Gallery in Kansas City, MO

Queen of the Angels Fraternity celebrated their Christmas Gathering by touring the Nelson Art Gallery in Kansas City. Docents led the tour set up for the fraternity and Sisters of St. Francis of the Holy Eucharist. The tour included Masterpiece art from 1300 to 1600. It included paintings, statues, reliquary, altars and more.

There were many references to St. Francis including Giotto's portrait of St. Francis receiving the stigmata from the Seraph Angel.

The Docent drew special attention to the original painting of Caravaggio's world famous portrait of St. John the Baptist in the Wilderness which draws tourist from around the world.



Queen of the Angels Supporting Life - St. Mary's Home for Mothers



Last fall, Queen of the Angels Fraternity planted over 400 plants and flowers at the 14 Stations of the Cross at St. Mary's Home for unwed mothers and children. Caitlyn Bailey, horticulturist, guided members in planning matching the flowers to the particular station. For example, the plants at the Crucifixion were all bright red. Veronica wiping the face of Christ, had native plants with the name "Veronica".



They fraternity also provided two cement benches and 10 native Missouri trees to beautify the grounds, making it more conducive to meditation and prayer.



Afterwards, Fr. Rocha led the Stabat Mater as he incensed and blessed each of the 14 stations. Janice Cox and Dona Gibbons were also in attendance. Fraternity members were in awe at the growth of the flowers and plants they had planted the previous year.
