#### Minister's Message

Hello Franciscans!

Centenary of St. Francis 2024 The Stigmata

St. Francis desired from early on in his life to be



a knight. Knights typically wear heavy metal armor for strength and to defend themselves in battle. After entering battle and being held prisoner for a year, during which time Francis turned to Scripture many times for comfort, the Gospel challenged Francis with the still unfamiliar values of Christian discipleship. St. Francis returned to Assisi and experienced conversion which included his call from

our Lord to, "Rebuild my Church." St. Francis became a knight in Christ's army and in 1224 he obtained, the armor of Christ, the Stigmata. St. Francis' stigmata included the nails in his hands and feet (not open wounds like St. Padre Pio), thus he began wearing sandals due to the pain of the Stigmata in his feet. Christ was most powerful when he was nailed to the Cross, when he was at what appeared to be His weakest moment. Remember in 2 Corinthians 12 Paul quotes Jesus who said, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." In the end, St. Francis was a knight like he desired so much, but in a spiritual army with spiritual armor.

The REC met in Victoria, KS at the Capuchin Spiritual Life Center in Victoria, KS February 23 - 25, 2024. We spent time in prayer, fellowship and business. We arrived Friday at 3 p.m. and spent time in prayer from 4 - 4:30 p.m. in the chapel in silence, praying the Franciscan Family Vocations Chaplet, and examined our conscience using the Examination of conscience in

the Spirit of St. Francis from the national website under the links for Stigmata 2024. Microsoft Word - An Examination of Conscience in the Spirit of St. Francis.doc (secularfranciscansusa.org)

We then went to Hays for a free will offering soup supper at St. Joseph's church and prayed the Stations of the Cross with the local church community. We finished the evening with the Liturgy of the Hours. Saturday we began with the Liturgy of the Hours and Fr. Damian Richards, pastor of St. Nicholas of Myra, Hays and St. Francis of Assisi, Munjor parishes gave two conference talks, one on the San Damiano cross icon and the Stigmata of St. Francis by St. Bonaventure. The business meeting was conducted, and we worked through our agenda through the afternoon, planning the summer gathering, visitation and elections schedule and assignment of fraternal and pastoral visitors, preparing the annual report for national, and discussing issues that affect local fraternities in our region. We celebrated Mass with the local community in Victoria, ate supper together, then prayed evening prayer together and retired for the evening. Sunday morning we prayed the Liturgy of the Hours together and headed home.

We have tried to keep the summer gathering affordable, but the cost of room, board, and meeting rooms keep increasing so we have had to increase the cost for those attending. The registration will be coming out very soon for the summer gathering (June 14 - 16, 2024 in Wichita, Theme: Live Like Francis, Speakers: The Knights of the Holy Eucharist).

April 2, 2024 is the local ministers' zoom meeting. This is a time for the ministers to see each other since we are so far apart to share/visit/ask questions etc.

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



# **Meeting Christ in Prayer**

What a gift our God, Creator of all things, has given us; the gift of **prayer and contemplation**. These are the means to know, love and serve Him. To know His will is to be steeped in prayer. We must first ask for the desire to be one with the Lord in prayer. To contemplate His mysteries. To learn how to love and forgive as He does. When Christ walked this earth He put the Father first. Christ knew the will of the Father and fulfilled that will perfectly. With removing himself from the world Christ remained in prayer and contemplation for hours into the night. But Christ had to remove himself from the world in order to accomplish perfect prayer. Perfect union with the Father. Perfect obedience to the Father's will. And Francis followed Christ in His ways of prayer and contemplation.

"The brother's then asked Blessed Francis to teach them how to pray. Speaking simply, he passed on to them this formula saying, "When you will pray, say 'Our Father' and 'We adore you, Lord Jesus Christ, in all your churches throughout the whole world, and we bless you, because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world."

We know from the writings about St. Francis of his desire to love God and follow Christ, living the Gospels out in daily life – day to day. There are testimonies, there are Francis' own writings and there are prayers written by Francis, inspired by his love for God. Francis' <u>Prayer Before The Crucifix</u>, "Most high and glorious God, enlighten the darkness of my heart...to carry out your holy and true will" is beneficial to us who daily seek the will of God. This is a prayer you may want to include along with your daily prayers.

As Francis told his brothers, begin with the prayer to Our Father and then the prayer, "We adore you, Lord Jesus Christ,...you have redeemed the world." Our ways should be Christ's ways. So let us Franciscans be obedient as Christ was. The OFS Rule states,

"As Jesus was the true worshipper of the Father, so let prayer and contemplation be the soul of all they are and do.

Let them participate in the sacramental life of the Church, above all the Eucharist. Let them join in liturgical prayer in one of the forms proposed by the Church, reliving the mysteries of the life of Christ." The Rule of the OFS Article 8

This dear brothers and sisters is ours to do. Prayer and contemplation. Use the formula our Seraphic Father gave to his brothers and stay with Christ in contemplation, reliving the mysteries of His life.



### National Saint Padre Pio Foundation has opened a chapel in rural Kansas

Padre Pio of Pietrelcina OFM Cap. is known for numerous miracles, prophecies, and healings associated with his intercession. Like St. Francis of Assisi, he also bore the stigmata, the wounds of Christ. Devotion to Padre Pio has grown all over the United States and the world.



The Saint Padre Pio Foundation has a plan is to inaugurate five chapels dedicated to the saint, each with a first-class relic, across the United States in the four cardinal directions so that they form the shape of a cross on a map. The Kansas chapel is the first one and forms the cross' center.

Luciano Lamonarca, founder of the Saint Padre Pio Foundation, said he chose the Diocese of Salina to be the site of the first chapel to open <u>because of its geographic centrality in the United States.</u> Lamonarca said when he approached Bishop Vincke it was "more than easy" to get the bishop to agree to host the relic permanently in his diocese. The foundation owns the relics and up to now has been loaning them out frequently all over the world.

The inaugural chapel opened inside St. John the Baptist Catholic Church in Beloit, Kansas with a Mass celebrated by Bishop Gerald Vincke of the Diocese of Salina. "It was inspiring, the positive response I had from the bishop," Lamonarca commented.

The five relics of St. Pio that will be housed in the five chapels are parts of a cloth used to cleanse the stigmatic wound in his side. The cloth is stained with his blood. The Catholic Church has a long tradition of giving honor to relics — objects that have a direct association with the saints or with Christ himself.

First-class relics are parts of a saint's body, such as flesh, blood, hair, or teeth; second-class relics are items or fragments of items owned by a saint; and third-class relics are those items that a saint touched or that have been touched to a first-, second-, or other third-class relic.

Relics are not worshipped but are given honor — "venerated" — because of the saint's love of and closeness to God. Those praying with relics often ask that saint to pray for them.

#### LENTEN MINI RETREAT AT SPIRITUAL LIFE CENTER



# Kansas City Metro Fraternities Team Up to Share Vocation Stories

Joint Vocation Presentation for 6th Graders at Cure of Ars School by Megan Ratzlaff OFS and Linus Drouhard OFS.







Secular Franciscans Linus Drouhard (St. Elizabeth of Hungary Fraternity) and Megan Ratzlaff (Our Lady of Sorrows Fraternity) were invited to speak to about seventy sixth graders (three classes) at Cure of Ars Catholic School in Leawood, KS, by Teacher Amy Craig. The presentation occurred on February 22<sup>nd</sup>, the feast of the Chair of Saint Peter and the memorial of St. Margaret of Cortona (a third order Franciscan from the 1200s and Megan's patron saint.)

The half hour presentation, with fifteen minutes afterwards for questions, went very well. The presentation started off with Megan sharing her story of her Catholic faith from childhood to adulthood and how she came about finding her vocation as a newly professed Secular Franciscan. Linus followed in the presentation with a saint reading, his story as a tenured Secular Franciscan, and some facts about the Franciscans in general. During the presentation, the sixth graders were engaged and interested in learning. They had been studying different religious orders with the guidance of their teachers, and already had a wealth of knowledge about religious life.

The children's questions were inspired and thoughtful. They asked questions such as: Who are some Franciscan role models that you follow? What are some of the rules of the Secular Franciscan Order? What kind of clothes/habit do we need to wear? What is the hardest thing about being a Secular Franciscan? And do we get paid (ha-ha)? These questions were answered by both Linus and Megan, and it was good for the 6<sup>th</sup> graders to get a perspective from a tenured Franciscan and a newly professed Franciscan as well as both a man and a woman.

After the presentation, Linus passed out some bookmarks, and many sixth graders came up to personally thank Linus and Megan for sharing their stories. It was impressive how polite and grateful the children were. Cure of Ars Teacher Amy Craig, sent a follow-up text the next day expressing her gratitude for Linus and Megan coming to speak to the classes.

On the outskirts of Mexico City, the Virgin Mary appears to a simple indigenous man and makes a humble request—And millions of people were converted!




#### of the Nine-Month Novena to Our Lady of Guadalupe 12 March to 12 December, 2024

#### OUTREACH TO FIRST NATION PEOPLE

Outreach to First Nation People is a non-profit foundation formed by three members of the Brother Jacoba Fraternity in Lawrence, Kansas, in March, 2016. This program provides clothing, shoes, bedding and blankets, beds and mattresses, dinnerware and kitchenware, furniture, toys, and books to remote Native American reservations which as a result of being so remote are highly unlikely to have access to agencies and organizations offering assistance of this nature. The majority of items are obtained through donations from local churches subsequent to church" sales when an abundance of items remain unsold. However, we also receive welcomed donations from individuals in the community. Clothing is sorted to ensure quality and boxed according to men's, women's, girls' and boys'. When sufficient items are available to warrant a trip to a reservation and when a person who is able to ensure fair distribution of the items on a reservation in need is contacted, a large moving truck is rented and a trip is made to a selected reservation where there is a person with whom we are able to coordinate a trip.

Transportation and storage costs are the only expenses which the foundation incurs. Each step of the process is provided by volunteers, members from our Franciscan fraternity as well as from the Lawrence community. Volunteers have included National Honor Society high school students and foreign students attending federally funded short courses at Kansas University.

Our non-profit has no paid staff. Our most recent trips were to the Black Mesa Chapter of the Navajo Nation in Arizona, in September, 2023, the Cheyenne River reservation of the Lakota Sioux Nation at Eagle Butte, South Dakota in November, 2023 which included 30 large boxes of wrapped Christmas toys, and to the Northern Cheyenne reservation in southeast Montana which included over 200 winter coats in January, 2024. Most of our monetary donations are from local individuals, the Brother Jacoba secular Franciscan fraternity in Lawrence, the Rotary Club of Lawrence, the Catholic Student Center of Haskell University in Lawrence, and work projects to raise funds for our non-profit completed by volunteers.

We believe that our mission is to the truly forgotten and neglected poor who are so remote from civilization that most people are unaware of their plight and the extent of their poverty. # St. Francis of Assisi Fraternity in Oklahoma City Assists Local Parish in Serving the Homeless

The St. Francis of Assisi Fraternity of Oklahoma City, out of St Eugene's Catholic Church, has been providing food and clothing for the homeless in downtown OKC on the second Saturday of the month for several years. Our Homeless Ministry volunteers, consisting of members of our Fraternity and St. Eugene parishioners who have joined our cause, make ham sandwiches and gather a variety of foods. We proceed to two separate parking lots in downtown OKC and hand out food, blankets, and any clothing that has been donated. At St. Eugene's, the Fraternity has a donation box for parishioners to drop off clothing and/or nonperishable foods for the homeless.

The outing scheduled for January 13 was most unusual. The weather forecast for that Saturday was calling for a frigid, single digit wind chill. After checking with sev-

eral parishioners who had experienced trying to feed the homeless in similar conditions. We were warned that there would not be anyone outside because the shelters were opening their doors due to the severe weather. Previously, we had approached the Homeless Alliance, one of the organizations that provide assistance to the homeless, to use their kitchen and dining facilities to distribute food and clothing. However, another group oversees preparing and feeding lunch on the second Saturday.

We were asked if we could help assemble "dinner bags" as the shelter did not provide an evening meal for the 300 + people who were being housed during this cold snap. The Homeless Alliance already had all the food on hand but needed help. I contacted our normal crew of volunteers, who all STARTS

said they would be glad to help. Instead of our normal routine we wrapped and bagged 607 sandwiches with fruit, chips, and granola bars. We also donated eight ham bones to the Homeless Alliance to make soup. It was an extremely rewarding day as we were able to provide the needed labor for a worthy cause. We were told we had bagged more than two days' worth of "dinners."

#### Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation (JPIC)

Last time I wrote, I mentioned that Joe Makley, our new national OFS JPIC animator, planned to offer JPIC gatherings online every few months so we could share knowledge and resources.

The Spiritual Assistant for the OFS JPIC Commission, Brother David Buer, OFM., of St. Louis, Missouri, opened our session with a beautiful reflection and prayer. For this column, I thought I would share his remarks with you. It was 30 years ago when I was working out of our province's Social Justice office in Oakland, CA that our provincial at that time, Joe Chinnici, came from his office down the hall to tell us that beginning immediately, our office would now be called JPIC, for Justice, Peace, and the Integrity of Creation. He had just returned from a meeting of the U. S. Provincials, where that decision had been made.

It was a prophetic decision to include Creation in the work of Justice and Peace. Over the last several decades, there has been an increased focus on protecting the environment—culminating in Pope Francis' encyclical Laudato Si. It is what Br. Keith Warner, ofm, called during the 2016 Quinquennial in St. Louis, "the most Franciscan encyclical ever."

So, when asked, "What is JPIC?" We can explain it is a focus on two considerations--humanity and the earth we live on. Like Jesus, St. Francis was a pacifist. "If you want to follow my way of following Christ, you cannot bear arms against anyone." (paraphrased) So to be a Franciscan we live not domineeringly, but with vulnerability. We live consciously, so when we see wrong, we try to right it. Now our young people are helping us be more respectful toward the animals, plants, and other creatures who we share the earth with. Laudato Si encourages the whole church and humanity to increase this consciousness.

Just before Christmas a friar friend sent me a new book entitled, "Seeing Jesus in the Eyes of the Oppressed--A History of Franciscans Working for Peace and Justice" by Paul Murray, a retired Sociology Professor from the Franciscan Siena College in upstate New York. Although it does not focus much on Creation, the book does highlight 8 Franciscans who worked for

Peace and Justice in the late 20th century and early 21st century. It consists of 8 Chapters;

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each Chapter covers one Franciscan working for Peace and Justice after Vatican II. There are four OFM friars; one Capuchin friar; and three Franciscan Sisters.

<u>Racial Justice</u>: Fr. Nathaniel Machesky, OFM; Sr. Antona Ebo, OSF; Br. Booker Ashe, OFM Cap; and Sr. Thea Bowman, FSPA found themselves in the middle of the Civil Rights movement beginning in the 1960s, in the south and inner cities.

<u>Farm Worker Justice</u>: Alan McCoy, OFM; Patricia Dryly, OSF; and Louie Vitale, OFM worked closely with Cesar Chavez of the United Farm Workers (UFW).

Sanctuary for Migrants: In the 1980s Joe Nangle, OFM (a returned missionary from Bolivia) worked with Fr. Alan through the Conference of Major Superiors of Men (CMSM), to respond to the refugees from El Salvador and other countries of Central America. Fr. Louie, while provincial, declared the St. Barbara Province a place of Sanctuary. Fr. Joe lived at the Assisi Community in Washington, DC. They offered hospitality to migrants and to Sr. Diana Ortiz, OSF (who had been tortured in Guatemala)

<u>Peace Making</u>: Fr. Louis co-founded the Nevada Desert Experience (NDE) and Pace e Bene, working to warn the world of the potential horror of nuclear weapons and how to make Social Change happen using nonviolent methods. He also spent time in prison using nonviolent protest. He spent one 6-month sentence for protesting the torture methods taught and used by the U. S. military in Central America and Guantanamo Bay in Cuba.

I apologize that all these examples are of Franciscan Religious, but we know there are many examples of Secular Franciscans working for an end to racism [Fr. Phil Marquard, ofm in Chicago, gave the Secular Franciscan Peace Award to Martin Luther King in 1966] Other Secular Franciscans are known for being protectors of democracy, being peacemakers, protecting human life, and being advocates of the poor.

As animators of JPIC in your Region, I invite you to take time to prayerfully discern: What JPIC efforts are already taking place in your part of the country? What injustice is going on in your part of the country that could use a calming Franciscan presence, or a bold Franciscan intervention?
